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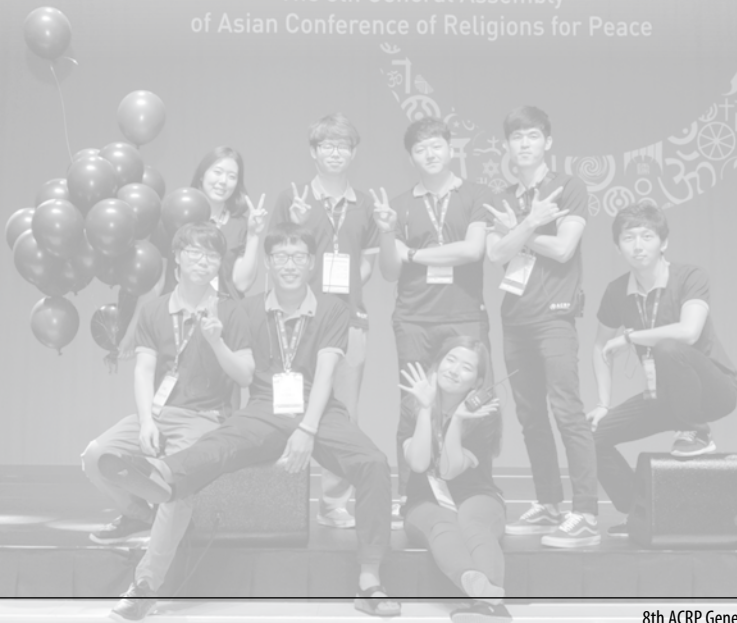

Pre-Assembly Meetings | 25 August 2014

Women's Pre-Assembly continues to engage woman in promotion of unity and harmony

With a red backdrop and a big symbol of a dove, the 8th Women's Pre-Assembly Meeting gathered Asian women leaders whose faith in peace processes and their role in effecting unity and harmony in Asian societies is as passionate and determined like the color red, and as ready to transcend beyond their limitations like the dove.



Dr. Sunggon Kim, Asian Conference of Religions for Peace (ACRP) Secretary General, welcomed delegates from across Asia at the Songdo Convensia in Incheon Republic of Korea last August 25, 2014.



The speakers for the plenary session talked about different aspects on peace building, on how women can promote peace through education and reconciliation and about sustainable development and stewardship of environment.

Dr. Kezevino Aram, directress of Shanti Ashram India, recalled an anecdote from his father and founder of Shanti Ashram, Dr. M. Aram. "Building public opinion in favor of peace is key," she said.



"We must acknowledge the great need to build the capacities of leaders not only to speak about peace but to also work for peace and to strengthen public opinion in the global level," Dr. Aram added.

Dr. Aram sought for education as a means for peace, transformational leadership, and reconciliation.

Along with that she said we must not forget about unresolved challenges. These challenges call women to actively engage themselves in building unity and helping people experiencing inequalities.

"Where there is inequality one cannot expect justice and freedom," she said. "Our work is crucial and it will contribute to real unity."



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For Dr. Parichat Suwanbubha, co-secretary of Religions for Peace Thailand, it is through peace education and reconciliation that one can become an instrument in effecting unity and harmony in Asian societies.

Dr. Suwanbubha says that her model of peace education is based on seven beliefs. But she focused only on “being compassionate and doing no harm, respecting human dignity, and being true to one’s self.”

She wanted a humanistic approach to education rather than a subject concerned with openly expressed or hidden conflicts.

A culture of peace, she said, will “reduce violence and support transformation of conflicts advancing to this particular culture.”

Rev. Elga Sarapung, directress of Interfidei in Indonesia, nodded to Dr. Suwanbubha’s respect for human rights and dignity.

Rev. Sarapung cited the violence against rights and dignity of Papuan Women. In 2010, she said that there have been 261 cases of violence against women that took place between the years 1963-2009.

The Papuan women hope for justice, truth, equality and peace in Papua Indonesia.

She hoped for concrete and serious actions from their government especially in dealing with law enforcement and recovery of victims.

Dr. Lillian Sison, director of the University of Santo Tomas Office of International Relations and Programs, focused on empowering women for development and stewardship of the environment.

She said that women’s access to basic services such as education, health care, housing, and participation in the decision making process in the governance forum must be ensured because it’s importance for

their sustainable growth and development.

Dr. Sison cited a case of the ACRP Philippines in “empowering women in responding to environmental crisis situations.”

Super-typhoon Haiyan, which devastated the Visayas region in the Philippines in 2013, brought a massive destruction on infrastructure and a horrible emotional impact to affected individuals.

They created a program where women in the community are taught in responding to crisis situations and promoting of community trauma healing mechanisms.

She said that it is through empowering women in responding to environmental crisis where they become prepared for future calamities.

“The whole town benefited from the impact of the program through it services,” she said.

Meanwhile, the new leaders for the Women Committee for 2014-2019 are as follows: Dr. Lillian Sison (Philippines) as chair, Dr. Dee-pali Bhanot (India) and Ms. Dianne Hirsh (Australia), co-chairs, and Ms. Yukiko Moriwaki (Japan), secretary.



The Youth Camp Activities

Seoul welcomed the youth delegates for a 3-day Youth Camp at the Namsan Youth Hostel on August 23-25, 2014. They started the morning with meditation and exercises. Then they had the opening ceremony, Dr. Sunggon Kim, Secretary General of ACRP gave a welcome speech. After that Rev. Kyoichi Sugino presented the "Methods and Mechanism for Multi Religious Cooperation". The delegates had a photo session. There was a special speech from Dr. Lim Hyung Jim on the Role of Religious Youth for Peace and Reunification in the Korean Peninsula, followed by Dahniel Anzar on "Presentation of AYC Work Plan". National Report were personated by each of the Nation Delegates. There were exchange of views suggestion and future action plans for RFP.

They celebrated their coming together with an amazing Culture Night. The performers wore their traditional dresses, presenting their cultures trough videos with national songs as background. Some of them performed traditional songs and dances. People from difference countries mingle with each other's, getting to know each other's in a joyful way.

The next day, they had a group discussion about "The Role of the Religious Youth for Peace in Asia". All the group members participated and elaborated concrete action plans and a new Youth Committee was elected, conformed by Dahniel Anzar Simanjuntak from Indonesia as Moderator. Hashimoto Takashi from Japan as Acting co-Moderator. Ms Huma Ikramulla Kashif from Pakistan as Secretary and Nyveditha Lakshmi Balachandran from Australia as Communication Officer.

The welcoming dinner was preceded by a farewell discourse of gratitude by Dr. Sunggon Kim, ACRP Secretary General, to all those made possible his work including a humble wish for a better performance and the most tender goodbye by the whole family.

The Official Opening of ACRP's 8th General Assembly: Unity and Harmony in Asia

Once more the opening was blessed by a mesmerizing cultural performance displaying the traditional beauty of the "dopo" costumes. After which Dr. Sung-gon Kim, the Secretary General of ACRP, welcomed the participants and delegates to the General Assembly and introduced this year's theme: Unity and Harmony in Asia.

The 8th Assembly of ACRP received congratulatory videos and remarks from prominent religious and civil society leaders: Hon. Swami Suhitanandaji Maharaj, general secretary of Ramakrishna Mission, His Holiness Pope Francis, Hon. Phan Wan-mathee, President, World Fellowship of

Buddhist, Hon. Dr. Olav Fyske Tveit, General Secretary World Council of Churches, Hon. Dr. Maria Voce, President, FOcolare, Hon. Fethullah Gulen, Founder Fethullah Gulen Movement and Hon. Ban Ki Moon, UN Secretary General.

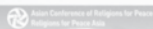
A dialogue of food and festivities

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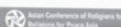


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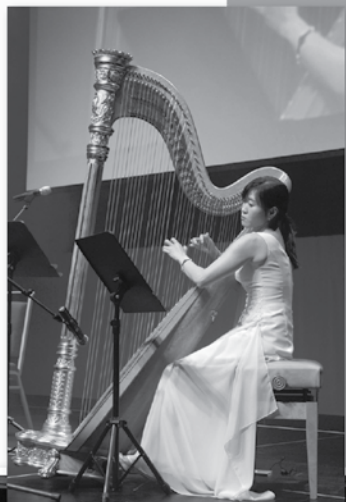


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Assemblies for Peace Asia
