reetings from the World Council of Churches

It is my pleasure to offer greetings as you gather at the 8th Asian Conference of Religions for Peace in Incheon, South Korea, under the theme "Unity and Harmony in Asia."

As you well know, Asia is one of the most religiously diverse regions in the world so we take keen interest in your conference deliberations and the outcomes and learnings which you shall share as we, the World Council of Churches, as a global fellowship of Christian churches has the similar goal as you to reflect on the role of religious adherents for peace, human rights and environment. Last year, we, too, met in South Korea (Busan) for our 10th Assembly, under the theme, "God of Life, lead us to justice and peace." That assembly's mandate has set us on a pilgrimage of justice and peace over these next several years.

We are well aware that while the basic tenets of most religions call us to live in and work for peace and justice, often it is various interpretations of those very same religions that fuel division and violence.

Earlier this year, the WCC organized a consultation to address the peace and reunification of the Korean peninsula. As I shared with the WCC central committee about the Korean peninsula and other situations of division and conflict, I share with you as you assemble to discuss these important matters.

First of all, we are human beings connected to one another. There is one Korean people and one Korean peninsula, still divided by the wars of the 20th century. The division is a root cause to the hostility, of division caused by the lack of peace, of division of families, of threats, of the suffering of innocent people.

I am mindful that as we commemorated the 100th anniversary of the start of World War I this year, we are addressing urgent geo-political conflicts and interests, security and military activities, human rights and peace in the Korean peninsula and in many other

areas of conflicts in the world. In this case as in other issues of justice and peace we are addressing, we should claim that a crisis and a conflict caused by human activities and misbehavior, basically affecting the ordinary human beings living there, must be and can be addressed by other human initiatives and relations. This requires also a spiritual courage.

To change the human-made tragic and stalled conditions, there must be somebody who has a vision for another reality, for another future, for another life together as human beings. There must be somebody who is willing to give priority to that human dimension first of all, to see the world from the perspective of the victims of conflicts, both men and women, old and young. There must be somebody who is willing to be in the shoes of the other, and see and act accordingly. There must be somebody who has the courage to build human relationships across the lines of conflicts, who can see a common cause as higher than the more narrow interests of one group.

May you have the spiritual courage to continue to work for the peace that is so desperately needed.

ear participants of the 8th Asian Assembly of Religions for Peace gathered together at Incheon,

On behalf of the Focolare Movement it is a great pleasure for me to send my very best wishes for the success of this Assembly. For about thirty years now we have been collaborating actively on different levels with Religions for Peace.

The title of this Conference, "Unity and harmony in Asia" is very significant in this moment of history. In a world which has become a global village everyone is called to face the enormous challenges shared by all men and women of the world. The immense Asian continent, with its populations of several billion people and a great variety of ethnic groups, languages, cultures and religions, can offer, perhaps more than any other, a witness of harmony and diversity.

Nevertheless, we know that also in Asia, tensions are not lacking, due at times to religions being manipulated in different ways. Here, then, is the need for a commitment on the part of Asians to arrive at a living together of peoples and religious groups in all the contexts of this continent.

Throughout the centuries Asia has had great prophets who had marked out pathways of harmony and fraternity. Mahatma Gandhi affirmed that "the world is held together by bonds of love" and "all humanity is one undivided and indivisible family, I cannot detach myself from the wickedest souls."

Today too love and the commitment to dialogue can also be the secrets towards the realization of that dream of universal brotherhood, which is close to our hearts and the hearts of the fathers of "Religions for Peace". Chiara Lubich, founder of the Focolare Movement, said in this way to those who asked her if it is possible to have an authentic dialogue between different cultures and religions:

"It's certainly impossible for those who do not know what it means to love, because loving means being ready to die, to die for the other person. We aren't always asked to die physically, but at least spiritually, and that is, to put aside all our thoughts, affections, desires, all that we plan to do, in order to listen to the other person. Putting everything to one side in order to listen to the other person is dying for us in order to enter into the reality of the other person, to understand him, to love him, to serve him. The other person does the same with me and this is the beginning of dialogue – it begins in this way. So for those who know how to love, dialogue is possible; for those who do not know how to love, dialogue is impossible."

My wish is that each one of you and the entire Congress may bear witness to the flourishing of a real commitment to dialogue founded on love, compassion, mercy and dedication, virtues which can be summed up in that Golden Rule present in each of our religious traditions. I am certain that this commitment will be a precious contribution towards realizing fully the title of this Conference – Unity and Harmony – in Asia and beyond.

As such, Allah abhors bloodshed and discord among human beings and encourages peace, order and cohesion as the best of conduct and behavior. Islam, which denotes peace, serenity, unity, cohesion and well-being, demands that human beings live in mutual understanding, peace, calm and harmony.
