







## legal framework

In Kyrgyzstan, religious activities are regulated by the Law "On Freedom of Religion and Religious Organizations" (2008), which tightened registration requirements for religious groups. The law guarantees freedom of belief while establishing strict procedures for the registration and operation of religious organizations.

Freedom of religion is enshrined in the Constitution and international documents. Kyrgyzstan is a secular state, and respect for all religions is mandatory. All people have the right to freedom of religion without discrimination on religious or ideological grounds.





### Mufti of Kyrgyzstan – Abdulaziz qary Zakirov

Abdulaziz qary Zakirov, 45, is the Mufti of Kyrgyzstan with religious education from Turkey and Bishkek, and a law degree. He speaks Arabic and Turkish, and previously served as chief imam in Bazar-Korgon, Jalal-Abad region.



## **Kadyr Malikov**

Kadyr Malikov is a well-known Kyrgyz theologian and public figure specializing in Islamic jurisprudence and religious moderation. Born in 1972 in Bishkek, he studied in Jordan and Spain, later serving as Deputy Mufti of Kyrgyzstan. In 2015, he survived an attack by extremists but chose to forgive his assailants, continuing his work promoting tolerance, education, and resilience against radicalism.





### Patriarch of the Orthodox Church. Savvaty

Patriarch Savvaty (secular name Sergey Nikolaevich Zagrebelny; born August 5, 1967, in Sosnovskoye, Omsk Region) is a hierarch of the Russian Orthodox Church. He serves as Bishop of Bishkek and Kyrgyzstan within the Central Asian Metropolitan District and also holds the title of Bishop of Bronnitsy, vicar to the Patriarch of Moscow and All Russia. A former army officer, he embraced Orthodox Christianity in 1990, was ordained in 1995, and later tonsured a monk. He is known for his contributions to the development of monastic life, interfaith development of monastic life, interfaith dialogue in Kyrgyzstan, and humanitarian initiatives.

## Father Anthony Corcoran

Father Anthony Corcoran, SJ, is an American Jesuit priest and the Apostolic Administrator of the Catholic Church in Kyrgyzstan, appointed by Pope Francis in 2017. Born in Tucson, Arizona, he has served in the former Soviet Union since 1997, focusing on pastoral care, interfaith dialogue, and social outreach. He leads a small Catholic community in a predominantly Muslim country, emphasizing humility and service to the marginalized.

### **Junsei Terasawa**

Junsei Terasawa (born September 15, 1950, in Hakui, Japan) is a Buddhist monk of the Nipponzan Myōhōji order and a prominent peace activist across Eurasia. A disciple of Nichidatsu Fujii, he studied in India and has led peace marches, built Peace Pagodas, and promoted interfaith dialogue in conflict zones like Chechnya and Iraq. In 2017, he joined the International Advisory Board of the Twelve Gates Foundation, continuing his work for global peace.

## V International Conference:

"KYRGYZSTAN — A COUNTRY OF INTERFAITH PEACE AND HARMONY"

Organized by the State Commission for Religious Affairs of the Kyrgyz Republic. The participants were representatives of relevant government agencies of Kyrgyzstan, Kazakhstan, Uzbekistan and other countries, as well as spiritual leaders, including the Mufti of Kyrgyzstan Zamir Rakiev and Metropolitan Vikenty of Tashkent and Uzbekistan. The conference brought together experts from more than 20 countries to discuss topical issues of the religious sphere, strengthening stability and interfaith harmony.







#### INTERFAITH ROUNDTABLE IN RESPONSE TO THE BURNING OF THE QURAN

In 2023, when a copy of the Quran was burned abroad in a shocking act of provocation, religious leaders in Kyrgyzstan responded not with division — but with unity. An interfaith roundtable was immediately convened, bringing together representatives of Islam, Christianity, Judaism, and Buddhism. All participants strongly condemned the act, but more importantly, they stood in solidarity with the Muslim community and spoke out against religious hatred in all its forms. This wasn't just a political statement — it was a moment of shared moral clarity. Leaders emphasized that an attack on one religion is an attack on all, and that mutual respect is the foundation of a peaceful society. The event reinforced a simple but vital truth: in Kyrgyzstan, religious communities will always support each other when it matters most.







## Humanitarian Support from Kyrgyzstan to Gaza

HUMANITARIAN SUPPORT FROM KYRGYZSTAN TO GAZA WITH THE SUPPORT OF THE INTERFAITH COUNCIL (IFC), THE ISLAMIC FOUNDATION UMMA, LED BY ELIANA-MARYAM SATAROVA, ORGANIZED HUMANITARIAN AID FOR GAZA ON BEHALF OF THE KYRGYZ PEOPLE. AID WAS DELIVERED VIA EGYPT TO NEARLY 2 MILLION DISPLACED CIVILIANS IN SOUTHERN GAZA. THE FOUNDATION ALSO HELD PEACEFUL SOLIDARITY EVENTS AND FUNDRAISING CAMPAIGNS.

IFC CONTINUES OUTREACH EFFORTS, EMPHASIZING THAT THIS IS A POLITICAL CRISIS WITH COMPLEX ROOTS. MANY MEMBERS OF THE JEWISH COMMUNITY AND OTHERS HAVE SPOKEN OUT AGAINST THE VIOLENCE AND EXPRESSED SOLIDARITY WITH PALESTINIAN CIVILIANS.



### Dialogue Within the Jewish Community on Palestine

The Interfaith Council (IFC) organized two closed-door conferences with members of the Jewish community in Kyrgyzstan, bringing together experts and representatives from other faith communities. These events created a safe space for open and respectful dialogue on the Gaza-Palestine conflict. Participants discussed the humanitarian crisis, political dimensions, and moral concerns shared across faiths. The IFC emphasized that many members of the Jewish community—locally and globally—oppose the violence and advocate for peace and justice for all civilians.

## "Friendship and Unity" iftar.

On March 28, 2025, the Independent Analytical and research Center "Religion, Law and Politics", under the leadership of Kadyr aji Malik, organized a round table on the topic "Palestine is the pain of all mankind." The meeting was held in partnership with the Islamic magazine Umma in the INNOVA celebration hall (12 Madieva Street, Kok Zhar village). The participants discussed the situation in Palestine, the humanitarian crisis in the Gaza Strip, the importance of the Al-Aqsa Mosque for Muslims, as well as the impact of events on world politics. The purpose of the round table is to provide a humanitarian, legal and moral assessment of what is happening and to develop proposals for the support of the victims. After the discussion, the guests also took part in the "Friendship and Unity" iftar.

## National Agency for Religious and Interethnic Affairs under the President of the Kyrgyz Republic.

NARIA IS A GOVERNMENT AGENCY UNDER THE PRESIDENT OF KYRGYZSTAN THAT DEALS WITH RELIGIOUS ISSUES IN THE COUNTRY. IT REGISTERS ALL RELIGIOUS COMMUNITIES (CHURCHES, MOSQUES, TEMPLES, ETC.) SO THAT THEY CAN OFFICIALLY OPERATE. THE COMMISSION ENSURES THAT RELIGIOUS ORGANIZATIONS COMPLY WITH THE LAWS AND DO NOT VIOLATE PUBLIC ORDER. IF NECESSARY, IT CAN REFUSE TO REGISTER OR CLOSE A GROUP THAT CALLS FOR VIOLENCE OR INCITES CONFLICT. SHE ALSO CHECKS RELIGIOUS EDUCATIONAL INSTITUTIONS AND LITERATURE TO ENSURE THAT THEY DO NOT PROMOTE EXTREMISM OR HATRED. SINCE APRIL 2025, THIS COMMISSION HAS BECOME THE NATIONAL AGENCY FOR RELIGIOUS AFFAIRS AND INTERETHIC HARMONY UNDER THE PRESIDENT, WHOSE TASK REMAINS TO ENSURE THE SECULARISM OF THE STATE, FREEDOM OF RELIGION AND INTERFAITH HARMONY.
