#### Introduction

The Eastern Indonesian Women's Network (JPIT) is a network of 80 interfaith women from Eastern Indonesia (East Nusa Tenggara, Maluku, Sulawesi, Papua, and Kalimantan). This network focuses its activities on research and publications related to three themes: women, religion, and culture. JPIT's first research, publication, and advocacy focused on past gross human rights violations related to the 1965–1966 anti-communist violence in Indonesia. Since 2014, JPIT has actively assisted victims of human trafficking under the guise of Indonesian labor migration and examined the role of religions in preventing and addressing human trafficking in Eastern Indonesia. In the past five years, the network has also focused on agrarian conflicts that have led to ecological destruction and violence against indigenous communities, especially women, in several regions of Eastern Indonesia.

Women's issues are inextricably linked to the threat of gender-based violence, which involves women as victims of verbal, psychological, physical, and sexual violence. Based on 2024 data, the Indonesian National Commission on Violence Against Women recorded 339,782 cases of gender-based violence, 90% of which were online.[1] Internationally, specifically in Asia, the Canadian Ambassador to Asia noted that 88% of women aged 18–24 were victims of online gender-based violence.[2] In the context of Eastern Indonesia, the role of religion and culture further limits women's ability to mobilize and speak out. The persistent patriarchal culture that permeates society renders women second-class citizens and disregards their social importance.

Women's lives in Indonesia and across Asia as a whole are vulnerable to violence. Current unrest, amidst increasingly volatile political conditions in Indonesia and the world, has further limited the space for Indonesian and Asian women to find a safe space from the threat of violence. Therefore, JPIT in collaboration with Religions for Peace (RfP) Indonesia and the Asia Pacific Woman of Faith Network (APWoFN) of ACRP, will hold an online forum to exchange experiences and thoughts in responding to gender-based violence from women in Eastern Indonesia and Asia with the theme "Responding to Gender-Based Violence in the Asia Pacific and Eastern Indonesia: What needs to be done together and how to make it happen?

#### Objectives

- 1. Strengthen networks and solidarity of women and religions in responding to gender-based violence in Eastern Indonesia and Asia-Pacific.
- 2. Share experiences regarding to women's experiences in Eastern Indonesia and Asia-Pacific in responding to gender-based violence. What good things have been achieved, what are the challenges and threats, and what solution has been taken?
- 3. Gather concrete ideas on what needs to be done together and how to implement it.

### Participants

Participants in the open discussion from religious leaders, interfaith-based organizations, women's organizations, activists in Indonesia and Asia, JPIT, Religions for Peace Indonesia, APWoFN, and ACRP as well from Religions for Peace, globally.
